PRECISIONS AND INSTRUCTIONS FOR THE SEASON 2000/2001 EDITION 2 (Nov. 2000)

- National Ski Associations *
- Organizers of all alpine events listed in the FIS Calendar
- Technical Delegates according to their assignment

* Will be sent to the National Ski Associations to the attention of the team captains and trainers.
The reproduction of further copies is duty of the National Associations.

1. ICR 2000

1.1 Complement: Art. 203.5.4

Every competitor automatically loses his old FIS points if he changes his National Ski Association. The FIS Council may grant exceptions for justifiable cases.

1.2 Art. 205.6 Support for the Competitors

205.6.1 A competitor who has a valid FIS license may accept:

205.6.2 full compensation for travel cost to training and competition.

205.6.6 social security including insurance for training and competition;

1.3 Art. 206 Sponsorships and Advertising

206.2 All compensation under such contracts must be made to the National Ski Association or its ski pool which shall receive the compensation subject to the regulations of each National Ski Association.

Competitors may not directly receive any part of such compensation except as stated in art. 205.6. The FIS may at any time call for a copy of the contract.

206.4 Competition Equipment at FIS Events

Text art. 206.7 (ICR 2000).

206.6 At FIS World Ski Championships and all events of the FIS Calendar, a competitor is not allowed to take equipment to the official medal ceremonies which have anthems and/or flag raising. Holding skis on the victory podium after the ceremony for press photos, pictures, etc. is however permitted.

206.7 An unofficial presentation (flower ceremony) of the winner, even before the protest time has expired, is allowed at the organizer's own risk.

1.4 Art. 603.4.9.4 In general

The TD

- Decides on questions which are not covered or are insufficiently covered by the FIS Rules, in so far as these have not already been decided by the Jury and do not fall within the scope of other authorities.
- Works very closely with the Referee and Assistant Referee.
- Has the right [-]
 - to cause the termination of a competition, if the prerequisites of art. 625 are present.
- Has the right to propose to the Jury the exclusion of competitors from participation in the race.
- Has the right to obtain support from the Organizing Committee and all officials under its jurisdiction in all matters necessary to the fulfillment of his duties.

[-] *Cancelled*: - to order the interruption of a competition, if the prerequisites of art. 624 are present,

1.5 Art. 604.4.4

For Downhill and Super-G, the TD must arrive at the competition site at least 48 hours before the draw for the first training. In all other events this must be at least 24 hours before the draw for the event concerned.

Complement: "and Super-G"

1.6 Art. 617.2.2

The announcement of unofficial times at the finish and start, together with written and oral announcement of disqualification, may replace the publication on the official notice board. In this case [-] it can be decided that protests can be delivered verbally to the Referee at the finish immediately or, at the latest, within 15 minutes after the announcement of the disqualification and that protests submitted after this are considered null and void. The team captains must be informed beforehand.

1.10 New: Art. 650.6.6.3 For all Disciplines

Homologation certificates are valid as long as no natural or artificial changes or changes in the regulations or technical requirements have occurred.

Natural changes can consist of erosion, land slides or the terrain becoming overgrown. Artificial changes are the construction of buildings, lifts, shelters, parks, roads or tracks etc.

1.11 Art. 680.1 Rigid Poles

Complement: Round, uniform poles with a diameter between a minimum of 20 mm and a maximum of 32 mm without joints are allowed as rigid poles. They must be of such a length that when set, they project about 1.80 m out of the snow and they must be made of a non-splintering material (plastic, plasticised bamboo or material with similar properties).

For Downhill a maximum diameter of 50 mm is allowed (Rigid poles and Flex-poles (max 35 mm)).

1.12 Complement: Art. 704 Official Training

For the downhill training of the Olympic Winter Games, FIS World Ski Championships, FIS World Cup and FIS Continental Cup special regulations may be issued.

1.13 Correction: Art. 1106.2

The Jury and the starter together will control the start. The start signal can only be given after the Jury has given the competitors permission to start.

Any starting system can be employed provided that the system guarantees a simultaneous start.

1.14: Correction: Art. 1200.3

The TD together with the Jury must check ahead of time that the lighting conforms to the rules.

1.15 The FIS Eligibility Rules (See Calendar 2000 - 2001 page 233)

2.3 Goggles

Goggles straps shall be as on products sold to the public and may carry two commercial markings of the effective producer, not larger than 15 cm² each.

Straps shall not measure more than 4 cm in width. In case of double straps only one strap may carry the commercial markings. Lenses must be free of advertising.

2.5.2 The front (in the middle) of helmets and all headwear worn in competition and within the competition area including for prize-giving ceremonies, interviews etc. should carry the emblem of the national team with a minimum size of 3 cm in any direction.

A national association may sign sponsorship contracts for helmet/headwear advertising rights of up to a maximum of 50 cm² (which may be divided between 2 identical - same size - logos) with firms who are not suppliers of ski equipment (hardware or software), subject to the regulations of each national association. In such a case, the front of helmets and headwear must carry the emblem of the national team with a minimum size of 3 cm in any direction.

The relevant advertising must be placed either to the side of or above the emblem of the national team.

For headbands the relevant advertising may be placed at the front of the headband, with the national emblem to the side.

No advertising is allowed on the movable or integrated chin straps of helmets.

II. By-laws for commercial markings and for advertising

A. Commercial markings

A.1 Trade names, brand names and logos of other products cannot be used as model names or be shown on ski equipment, except jumping skis and freestyle aerial skis.

A.3.4 For approval of commercial markings, it is strongly recommended to send a copy of all the commercial markings in their original size, form and color to the FIS before use. This should be done if possible before October 1st or before the corresponding season begins in the southern hemisphere.

B. Advertising with athletes

B.1 Advertising with athletes is allowed subject to the permission of the national association.

B.2 Names, titles and illustrations of particular athletes can only be used in advertising with the permission of the national association.

3. Continental Cup

3.1 Art. 7.4: Duration for payment of expenses

Expenses for lodging and food must be paid from the dinner of the night before the first competition to the lunch after the last competition.

The Organizer or the hotel manager may not demand the vacation of rooms earlier than 2 hours after the race by the teams on the day of the competition.

7.4.1 Precision

for one technical discipline = 1 day, 1 nights
 for two technical disciplines = 2 day, 2 nights
 for three technical disciplines = 3 day, 3 nights
 for four technical disciplines = 4 day, 4 nights

5. Miscellaneous

5.1 FIS World Ski Championships St. Anton (AUT)

5.1.1 Starting order (DH, SL, GS, SG, Comb. DH and SL)

(according to point 9.2.1 & 9.2.2 of the World Cup Rules)

The Best 30

The best 30 competitors present start according to the actual WCSL in the respective discipline. Those competitors whose total number of WCSL points (sum of DH, SL, GS, SG, K from OWG/WSC and World Cup) is at least 400 follow after the 1st group in the order of their discipline WCSL points, as long as they are classified within the top 30 competitors present on the WCSL in the actual discipline.

After the 30th competitor

Competitors with at least 400 who do not fulfill the above conditions start after the 30th competitor.

(Start order according to the discipline WCSL, if they do not have any then FIS points).

Thereafter competitors start according to FIS-points.

Those competitors who are classified in positions 31 - 35 of the valid WCSL in the discipline, will be enrolled after 45 according to their FIS-points, if they are not ranked in the best 45 competitors present.

5.1.2 Draw / choice of starting numbers

(According to point 9.3 and 9.3.1 of the World Cup rules)

- GS/SL: 1st group (1 - 15)

The first seven (7) competitors will be drawn by double-draw a start number between 1 - 7, the remainder between 8 - 15.

- DH/SG: 1st group (1 - 15)

The competitors in the first group chose their numbers from 1 - 30. The group of competitors with at least 400 WCSL points, who eligible to start after the 1st group, also chose their start number from 1 - 30. The leader of the WCSL in the respective discipline has the first choice. The remaining numbers will be drawn between the rest of the competitors (until 30).

Procedures and conditions

If several competitors are missing at the public choice/draw in DH/SG, they will drawn at the end of the draw amongst the remaining numbers. If only one is missing, he/she receives the number left over.

In SL/GS they will be drawn amongst the highest numbers (e.g. 15, 14). If only one is missing he/she receives the highest number (no. 15).

At a non-public start number selection, the team captain can chose for their competitors. (Procedure see point 9.3 DH/SG).

5.1.3 WCSL point allocation

In all alpine disciplines where medals are awarded, there are WCSL points for positions 1 to 15, according to the scale (point 10.1) of the World Cup rules. No WCSL points are given for the single events of the Combined.

5.1.4 Starting order in the Combined (See ICR Art. 1210.1.4.1)

5.1.5 Winner of the Combined (See ICR Art. 1210.1.5.1)

5.1.6 Time difference from the winning time (DH, SL, GS, SG, C)

If a competitor's time difference is more than eight (8) percent from the winning time, no WCSL points will be awarded irrespective of the rank achieved (see also point 10.2 of the World Cup rules).

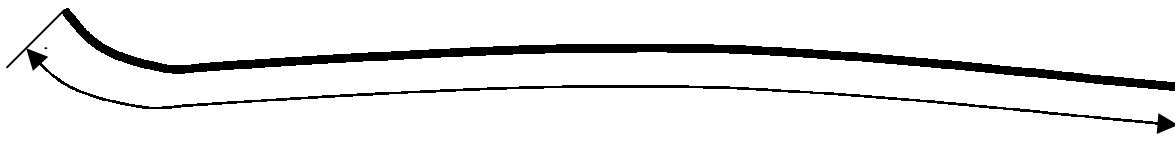

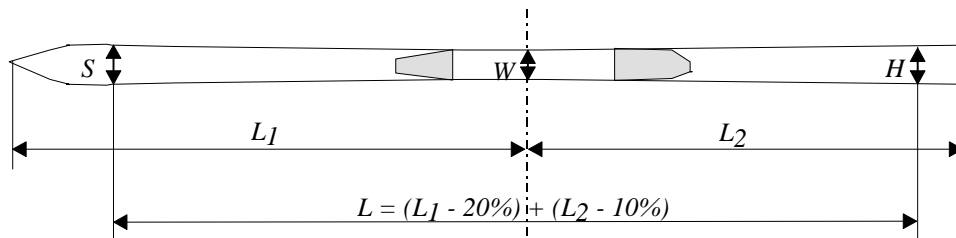
